Greiman City values many things including respect, friendship, inclusion, and of course, health. Yesterday, health commissioner Alina Arechiga took some time to ensure everyone was doing their best to keep the public safe from the bad: both physical and mental.

To relay the importance of personal hygiene in physical health, the health commissioner gave an eloquent speech. She reminded the Girls' state citizens the importance of washing their hands after using the restroom and before eating to prevent the transmission of bacterias in such a confined environment. If the citizens forgot hand soap, Ms. Arechiga suggested using shower soaps or requesting hand soap for purchase from Walmart. Dedicated to her position, she personally cleaned counters with anti-bacterial wipes and supplied hand sanitizer and cough drops to her fellow citizens. She furthermore encouraged the girls to use the paper plates available instead of just using their hands when indulging in city snacks, and to avoid sharing drinks out of the same bottle.

The health commissioner also addressed mental health in the state of Keystone. As a positive promoter on the executive board of Aevidum, a program that deals with anti-bullying and mental illnesses, Ms. Arechiga emphasized the importance of talking about feelings, especially when this camp may be the first time some of the girls are away from their families. She offered herself as someone to open up to, available for anyone who felt the need to talk, no matter their sexuality, race, or anything else.

Keeping the area clean and safe is extremely important. As visitors, preserving our borrowed space remains essential to convey our appreciation and remain healthy. If the environment is clean, chances are that the people have less chances of spreading airborne illnesses. Maintaining a balance between physical and mental health, however, remains critical to a healthy and happy life.

"Physical and mental health are different yet they are still connected, you need to take equal care of them to stay healthy," Ms. Arechiga said. "Having a friend by your side is always a plus".
