House Takes Action Against Gang Violence

Yesterday, the House passed a bill that encouraged the creation of after school programs for elementary school children. Bill sponsor Angela Campbell asserted that the creation of these extra curricular activities will put young children on the path to continued positive involvement in their communities and discourage involvement in gangs. The bill seeks to create an environment where children in underprivileged situations can meet with older mentors and foster their interests and talents.

As the bill was debated, some representatives took issue with the omission of provisions for transportation and the lack of cause to become involved. Though these issues were both raised, only one amendment was proposed. An amendment to move the program to middle school was proposed by a representative from Beister City. The representative argued that involvement in gangs does not occur until later in life than elementary school. The amendment failed due to counterargument during debate which explained that the goal of the bill was to teach the very young members of society about what positive involvement looks like.

The bill ultimately passed, showing that the House is committed to combating gang violence in Keystone's city.

The Hrinya Hawk Takes to the Streets

Today, Hrinya City Council Woman Kelly Meinert sponsored an ordinance that reads: "There shall be one citizen of Hrinya City who, in times of crisis or law enforcement indolence, who may take the enforcement of the law into their own hands and act as a vigilante."

The ordinance will create a vigilante in Hrinya and stipulates that this enforcer be referred to as the Hrinya Hawk. The ordinance also makes the chosen Hrinya Hawk conceal her identity at all costs. It also protects the Hrinya Hawk from any criminal charges for actions taken in the name of her role.

Residents eagerly await the arrival of the Hrinya Hawk on the streets of their crimeridden city. Hrinya resident Kristyn Kleinhenz shared her thoughts on the new ordinance: "I think it's a great idea and it will keep us safe. All those villains out there, you never know what will come about. It's good to know someone has your back."

Others believe that the police are already doing their best to curb crime in a more orderly manner. Kristyn, however, disagrees. She explains: "The police cannot do their job on their own. What about the super villains? The police can't fly, it's as simple as that."

The residents of Keystone are eagerly awaiting the results of this new law and some are beginning to wonder if their city needs a strong vigilante as well.

Lieutenant Governor Prosecuted in County Trial

The trial in Red County unfolded on Thursday, with County District Attorney Ivy Snyder, Public Defender Kaity Meeh, and County Magistrate Lisa Bakhodirova making up the court. The defendant was Melanie Sporn, who is now Lieutenant Governor of Keystone Girls State. The county prosecuted Melanie, a resident of Hrinya for violating several of Peterson City's ordinances on Monday.

The prosecution built a case based on the several eyewitness accounts of Melanie's alleged actions. The county charged her with violating Peterson's ordinance forbidding non-residents to wear shoes and prohibiting those who are not troopers from running. Annabella Anderson, the arresting officer and County Sheriff, testified to what occurred:

"I heard someone asking for an officer to help arrest someone," Annabella said, "She just bolted the other way. She was trying to get away from me." Annabella also identified those in the county who had watched the alleged crime occur. One such witness was Caleigh Fink, who testified next.

"First I heard footsteps pounding, then I heard loud voices," she testified, "I saw Melanie arrested and put in jail with her shoes on." Overall, the prosecution built a case that included several eyewitness accounts of Melanie breaking both the no-shoes rule and he no-running rule.

The defense, however, asserted that Melanie only broke Peterson's ordinance to be courteous, and that her arrest was uncessicarly physical. Jasmine Elsify testified for the defense, saying: "I was sitting in my lounge and suddenly Mel came in and said she had been arrested in Peterson for not taking off her shoes because she didn't want to because her feet smelled. Then she showed me the marks on her arm from the handcuffs."

Jasmine also described Melanie as "upset and distressed" after the arrest, and testified that a picture of the red marks left by the handcuffs during the arrest exists. The defendant herself then testified, corroborating Jasmine's account.

"I was walking and told everyone I wouldn't take my shoes off because my feet smelled bad, and then there's this person who comes running at me and I fell down and handcuffs were put on me very roughly," Melanie said.

When asked if the ordinances were clearly posted, Melanie said that while they were written, she could not see them because she was not wearing her contacts, meaning that they were not technically posted clearly for all people.

In the end, the jury of Melanie's peers found her guilty of both counts of violating the law. Melanie was sentenced to washing her feet by the County Magistrate.

Senate 5-20-19 Olivia Castilla

After heavy campaigning from both the Nationalists and Federalists, the senators from each of the cities came together in order to pass bills on the Senate floor.

The PO decided that instead of having debate over the amendments, we should instead just vote on the amendment to save time. And save time we did; we passed 5 bills in the Senate that will be very beneficial to Keystone's quality of living. The benefits included in these bills relate to foster care, infrastructure, eco-friendly bikes, and cleaning up amusement parks and concerts in order to attract tourists.

These new changes to our state are going to be a great benefit to our citizens' opportunities to have more money, get diplomas, and become more populous. A grand total of 3 people observed the Senate floor today through live-streaming, all of which were the delegates' parents.

My experience as the "Park" in Park v. White County

Coming to Keystone Girls State, I never imagined being on trial as the defense for a high-profile county court case. But on Thursday, June 21, I found myself in my blue dress suit and green crocs in front of the entire White County with my future on the line. I was arrested for breaking Reinhard's ordinance of running in the hallways on Monday, June 17 while trying to make it in time for the voting of the primary county elections.

My defense attorney was the brilliant Meg and she worked eagerly to defend my honor and vindicate me of such horrendous accusations and instead bring to light my experience of voter suppression. Despite voting being a fundamental right in our democracy, it is a fact that voter suppression occurs throughout our nation. As a result, my fight was against voter suppression.

When I was called to the witness chair, I was sweating profusely because I realized that if I was not able to clear my name, my case of voter suppression would not be taken seriously and this horrendous cycle of voter suppression would continue. My fight in the courtroom was not just about me, but for all citizens in White County who might face voter suppression. On the stand, I had to fight my tears back. My defense attorney, Meg made a strong argument citing U.S. Code 594 that anyone who intimidates a voter will be fined or imprisoned and the 15th Amendment that makes voting a right regardless of race. I had the support of witness and counselor Liz who clarified the gravity of this action of voter suppression by the Reinhard citizens.

District attorney, Anna, grilled me on the stand but I stood firm by my beliefs in the fundamental right to vote. Although the audience watching may have laughed, I refused to laugh because this was my life, honor, and legacy on the line.

After a long deliberation, the jury walked back with the verdict and my heart sunk when the honorable county magistrate, Sam, read the verdict, "The jury has come to the conclusion after a very extremely detailed debate that we just couldn't decide who was truly guilty. Half of us thought June was guilty and deserved absolutely no mercy, while the other half said 'eh, whatever.' So we debated some more. After a boatload of back and forth, all of us as a jury, a group of talented, diverse, and empowered young women, came to the final conclusion that the 'sexy jawn' aka June is indeed completely and utterly without a single doubt in our minds, is 1000%, drum roll please.... **GUILTY!!!**"

I was once again put in handcuffs and had to serve my eight minutes in county jail. On the way back to my city, I *speedwalked* as fast as possible back to make a statement. I will continue my fight here at Keystone Girls State.

She gathered everyone outside of her office to accommodate for the large group (which also included three girls from KGS, one of them being myself) and promptly began the conversation. One by one, she listened to the person's name, hometown, and concerns about the environment. It was no surprise that for every concern announced, Ullman sympathized with the interest in the issue and finding a solution. She clearly and passionately expressed her views on the specific topics brought to the surface by each of the advocates, and provided them with information about what she has done to contribute to the

solution of this problem and what she plans on accomplishing. One recurring topic what the Tohickon Creek

This is a main focus of Representative Ullman. The Tohickon Creek, located in Bucks county, is a tributary of the Delaware River, is facing some unfortunate and serious problems. With rising temperatures in bodies of water across the planet, this creek has experienced that warm increase. This not only affects the bed of the creek itself, but all of the organisms that comprise of its ecosystem. It is from the side effects of man and climate change that these unfortunate truths are occurring.

Ullman deliberated over her opinions and thoughts on how we could all be a part of the solution to this issue. It was important that she showed her knowledge on the subject, and she effectively did so by explaining the problems she saw with this creek that many others overlooked. The discussion really heightened when Ullman proceeded to ask *us*, the girls from KGS, what we thought about climate change and what citizens should be doing to solve it. While we all looked at each other for a moment, Caleigh Fink took a step forward and formulated a response in a few seconds. She talked about how groups like PennEnvironmental should be coming to our cities -- our schools, our places of work, our neighborhoods -- and educating the public and students about these issues. She explained how today many students are not aware of these issues because it can be considered a "taboo subject", sadly meaning that we are not educated to the extent of which we need to be in order to enact change. She also included the comment that many students are looking for service and volunteering opportunities, so visiting schools to talk about their association and spread awareness would be an effective way to accomplish their goal and gain volunteers to help their organization. Ullman and the others were impressed with her knowledge and contribution, and ensured us that they would definitely be taking her comments into consideration.
